Welcome to Act I our 2024 Season – we are thrilled to kick off our season with *Casey and Diana*, a powerfully moving play that takes place right up the street from this theatre. *Casey and Diana* is set at Casey House – Canada's first-free standing AIDS hospice, providing care and comfort to clients diagnosed with and dying of AIDS. In 1991, as this devastating epidemic was reaching its peak, Casey House received a historic visit from Diana, Princess of Wales. Playwright Nick Green, who's previously written about other queer history in Toronto including the queer magazine Body Politic and the Gay Pride march, takes us back to this time through an historic moment in time between caregivers, advocates, a princess, and people dying of AIDS. A moment that helped reshape the course of the AIDS pandemic by providing hope, challenging stigmas, and uniting a community. We're thrilled to bring this highly anticipated play here to Toronto after its sold out run at the Stratford Festival.

Next up in this season is the world premiere, *De Profundis: Oscar Wilde in Jail*, adapted by Gregory Prest, with original music and lyrics by Mike Ross and Sarah Wilson. Another play looking at queer history – through the lens of Oscar Wilde's letter he wrote to Lord Alfred Douglas while in jail for "gross indecency". Called 'the greatest love letter ever written' it's a bold and sexy take on Oscar Wilde: the wit, the poet, the playwright, the man who, in his own words, awoke the imagination of his century. In the title role is one of our country's brightest stars, Damien Atkins. I encourage you to come back to experience it.

We're so proud of our 2024 season - an ambitious season filled with powerful works by celebrated Canadian writers and reimagined classics by acclaimed international creators. You've likely heard about our next production: the highly anticipated take on Chekhov's *Three Sisters* by Inua Ellams. Set in 1960s Nigeria, this co-production with Obsidian Theatre features an all-star cast - book your tickets now for what's sure to be a memorable theatrical event.

Recently, I was inspired by an interview I did for *With Dignity*, the brilliant podcast written by Pippa Johnstone for Soulpepper about the history of Casey House. I was talking with Bree Fitzgerald, the granddaughter of June Callwood, about June's son Casey Frayne. He died at age 20 after being hit by an impaired driver. It's a tragic, painful story. In our interview, Bree suggested that likely June naming the house after him was an act of honouring his memory, and also perhaps an act of beaconing a shared experience with those who walk in the door; sudden and irreconcilable loss; senseless devastation; injustice; deep deep pain; and... what? The very deepest kind of sadness? Words fail.

Prior to the start of rehearsals for this production, I tried to write a new monologue. Interviews for the podcast, such as the one with Bree, were weighing heavily on me. When I spoke with Nancy Roe-Lucier, she told me about the loss of her father who was at Casey House on the day that Diana visited, and the ways that shame and prejudice impacted his life. In another interview, Michael Oscars played old videos of DQ events, laughing with joyful nostalgia before soberly pointing out the vast majority of men who didn't live to participate in the event the following year. I listened back to those and other accounts of the times, hearing voices tremble under the weight of emotions still so close to the surface, and I wrote.

Thomas stands center stage, nearly crumbling. "What is the word for this feeling?" he asks. There's no answer. "It's Casey. This house isn't named after someone's son. The name Casey means sudden, tragic, inexplicable and total loss. It means a loss that's wasteful and that you can't even understand. Casey is the numbness when the sadness runs out. Casey is the unfairness the fucking unfairness, the pulsing silence and the bottomless abyss and the irreversibility of it all. This is a house full of Casey."

I brought it to Sean and he was brilliant, naturally, and I was feeling pretty convinced. But then thinking about it in the context of this amazing true story, the awe-inspiring memories of kindness and transformation that had also been shared with me over the last seven years, the work that Casey House has done and continues to do today, I realized that it was all wrong. The word Casey means not being alone when you need people the most. Casey is the meeting point of fear and comfort, pain and compassion, loss and love. Casey is trying to make someone's life a bit better, even when that seems totally impossible. Casey is a hand to those facing feelings that words fail to describe.

I am so grateful this story came into my life, to those who helped me with it, and to you for coming to watch it. Above all I'm grateful to Casey House and all of those who came together and gave themselves, and continue to give today. May we all have Casey when we need it. May we all strive to give Casey to others.

The book *Sanctuary* by Patrick Conlon came out in early 1991, some months before the big visit on October 25 of that same year. It documented the early years of Casey House and how unusual it was as a hospice. Among its more painful distinctions: the average age of its clients was well under forty.

In one of its chapters, Jane Darville – executive director of the facility starting in 1990 – says of Casey House's decor: "Maybe in another year I won't like the grey walls...I don't know. I keep thinking this is the way hospices should be...an aura of calmness. And I become calm. I've tried to analyze it, but I don't have an answer." And yet, earlier in her account,

she provides a clue to her own riddle. She says: "It's very grey and tricky, dying." Is there some comfort to be found in walls that reflect the journeys they're containing? Or did those grey rooms quietly comfort their occupants (be it clients, nurses or visiting lovers, friends and family): "Remember, it's ok for this to be messy, nuanced and maybe in between things we fully understand."

In our return to the play this January, I'm reminded of how astutely Nick Green has observed the mess that human beings make when they decide (or can't help but decide) that relationships matter. Casey House emerged in a Toronto wherein people succumbing to AIDS could be found languishing in hospital rooms where all other furniture had been pushed up against the walls, where meals were left outside their door by fearful staff, where signage would make anyone think twice about paying a visit, let alone bathing or toileting the person facing their final days. Many people with HIV and AIDS, at this time, died a social death before their physical one. Casey House was the stuff of intervention, as if to say: you are not going to die alone in this city. Death, at Casey House – and a death specifically precipitated by AIDS – was going to be a relational process. Defiantly so.

Val, a hospice nurse who informed the original development of this production, said "The story of our death, just like our birth, is always left to someone else to tell." Casey House ensured that those dying of AIDS would be cared for, witnessed, and remembered. That their life stories would matter and leave a trace. This play emerges from that promise and keeps me dreaming about how much life happened in that house, how much colour and humour, heartbreak and love bounced off those grey backgrounds. I don't know if it's the stuff of calm, necessarily, but it does reassure me. It reaffirms for me what compassion and kindness can do in the face of what's unsolvable about this world, and living in it. It's an honour to bring this story to its 'home city', to collapse the distance in some small way between the past and now, to activate memory and legacy. And to encounter, anew, what's wonderful about the hard and human grey.

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The Story of Casey House

A welcoming place to die with dignity free from judgement

Casey House was founded by a group of intrepid volunteers led by activist and journalist June Callwood, as Canada's first stand-alone facility for people living with HIV/AIDS, and Ontario's first free-standing hospice. The doors first opened in 1988 during the height of the AIDS epidemic, in close proximity to Toronto's Gay Village. At that time, people living with HIV were typically ostracized from family and friends, and were often left to die alone. In contrast, Casey House believed their clients deserved dignity, compassion and respect. The first client was greeted with a warm hug, it was the first time he had been touched in months. This approach was emulated by Princess Diana during her iconic visit to Casey House on October 25, 1991 in a photo seen around the world; the princess touching someone living with HIV.

Leaders advancing HIV health care

As medical advances improved HIV treatment and outcomes, Casey House has evolved and grown from a hospice into a specialty hospital providing ground-breaking care to people living with and at risk of HIV. In 2017, they moved across the street

into a light-filled 58,000 sq. ft. facility. Just as in their first home, they provide a community and sense of belonging that connects people to care they may not have been able to access elsewhere. As leaders advancing HIV health care, they offer new services to meet the changing and complex needs of clients. In addition to a 14-bed inpatient unit for people requiring 24/7 medical care, there is a robust outpatient program for people who can benefit from a range of health services and social supports. The clinical team builds relationships through a harm reduction approach, and in 2021, opened Ontario's first hospital-based supervised consumption service for clients who use substances. Building on a legacy of advocacy and social justice, they actively dismantle barriers to care and safe living. The humanity of each client is at the heart of everything they do.
